

## CARBON MONOXIDE (CO) PROTOCOL

SYMPTOMS Initial symptoms of CO poisoning are very similar to flu like symptoms	
MILD EXPOSURE: MEDIUM EXPOSUE:	Slight headache, vomiting, nausea, fatigue. Severe headache, drowsiness, confusion, increased heart rate.
EXTREME EXPOSURE:	Unconsciousness, convulsions, heart and lung failure, brain damage, death.

<u>KNOW YOUR CO MANAUFACTURERS INFORMATION.</u> There will be an explanation of each sound on the back of the detector as well as in the instruction manual located in Safe Operating Procedures.

**IF THE ALARM SOUNDS**: verify the alarm is indicating a carbon monoxide emergency to avoid a false alarm. If it is an actual CO ALARM- call 911 and leave the premises.

**DO NOT OPEN WINDOWS OR DOORS**. Account for all individuals and staff and **DO NOT RE-ENTER** until deemed safe by fire personnel.

**FALSE ALARMS**: CO detectors respond to the presence of CO. If the detector sounds, verify the what the sound is indicating. If it is a non-alarm signal, have the unit replaced.

If you arrive home to the sound of the CO detector alarm, **DO NOT ENTER**. Call fire department from cell phone or nearby residence.

**MAINTENANCE:** Vacuum the CO detectors around openings of the detector at least once a month to eliminate dust and debris. Test detector after cleaning.

<u>ALWAYS CHECK EXPIRATION DATE ON DETECTORS</u> and replace prior to expiration date.
